Pupil Premium Statement 2013-14

Context

Pupil premium was introduced in April 2011 and is allocated to school based on the number of students who are known to be eligible for free school meals (FSM) or have been eligible for FSM at any point in the last six years. It is also allocated to children who have been in Local Authority care for more than six months (CYPIC) and also to service family children. From April 2014 pupil premium funding was also extended to children and young people with a care history (children adopted since December 2005, children subjected to Special Guardianship Orders and those who left Care under a Residence order after October 1991).

The national funding has been allocated to address current underlying inequalities between children eligible for FSM and their peers by ensuring that funding to tackle the disadvantaged reaches the students who need it. Statistics over time have shown that students who have been eligible for FSM at any point, have consistently lower educational attainment than those who have never been eligible for FSM.

Schools can decide how Pupil Premium Grant (PPG) is to be spent as they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual students within their responsibility. We are committed to allocating the PPG for the benefit of our most vulnerable and disadvantaged students.

St Gabriel's Allocation of funding 2013-14

The funding is allocated to school at the beginning of each financial year. The school is required to account for the use of the grant annually.

This information shows that in 2013-14:

- There is little difference between pupil progress in receipt of PPG funding and other pupils
- There is an achievement gap of 1 sub level in Year 9 maths and less than a sublevel in Year 7 maths
- Analysis of patterns in CYPIC pupils is statistically too small to form a judgment

This information shows that in 2013-14:

- There is a minimal gap in Year 10 progress in English
- In maths, pupils with PPG funding achieved better progress than all other pupils
- More PPG pupils exceeded national expectations and achieved A/A* grades in math
- The 5A*-C (including English and maths) PPG figure was below, but less than the gap nationally between pupils receiving PPG funding and all other pupils
- At Year 11 the achievement in English A*/A and A*-C and for progress was in line with the national difference for PPG when compared to all other pupils
- In maths, the gap for expected 3 levels progress was greater than the national gap
- However, PPG pupils performed better than all other pupils for exceeding 3 levels of progress made in maths and was in line with all other pupils achievement at A/A* GCSE maths
