CHAPLAINCY

Chaplaincy plays a central role in all areas of our school life. It is our aim that all students come to know and enjoy life-giving communion with the Father and with his Son, Jesus Christ. Our St Teresa of Calcutta Chapel is open for all members of our school family as a quiet space to reflect and pray.

Our GIFT Team (Growing In Faith Together) aims to share with others that which is most sacred in our school, the Good News of Jesus Christ. All members of our school community are given opportunities to respond, reflect, and act upon this message. Student leaders assist their Form Teacher in organising form prayers, reflections, collective worship in assemblies, special holy days and charity events.

At St Gabriel's, we have a vibrant 'Catholic Mission and Worship Team' who are involved in a wide ranging and varied part of school life, ranging from being a welcoming presence around the building, encouraging people to witness to their faith through their words and actions, meeting with students as a listening ear, scaffolding opportunities for formal and informal worship and making the word of God relevant to pupils and staff in their daily lives.

The Staff Liturgy Team is also extremely fortunate to receive the support and guidance of our local priests. Mass is offered at school on a regular basis alongside opportunities to receive the Sacrament of Reconciliation throughout the year. The Year 8 Sacrament of Confirmation programme is run jointly between the school and the local parish churches. St Gabriel's staff also support Local Youth IMPACT group. We also work closely with Just Youth Spiritans, who lead our Year 7 retreat days and Year 10 Peer Mentor training.



Students' opportunities for personal development are celebrated at St Gabriel's, as they are able to access a wide range of academic and extra-curricular enrichment opportunities. This includes all Year 7 pupils learning Level 1 British Sign Language.

We are fortunate to have inspirational colleagues leading Music, Drama, Art, Technology and PE, who support our students in developing their creative and practical God-given talents.

PERSONAL SOCIAL HEALTH CITIZENSHIP EDUCATION

The school uses high quality resources from the PSHE association, NHS, Barclays and other leading providers to help prepare students for life in modern Britain effectively. Weekly Personal Development lessons go beyond just the academic, working to enhance students' spiritual, moral, social and cultural development. Relationships, Sex and Health Education (RSHE) is taught using the Diocese approved programme 'Ten Ten - Life to the Full'. Resources ensure that lessons are taught within the context of a Christian understanding of human sexuality, rooted in the wisdom and doctrine of the Catholic Church.

CAREERS EDUCATION, INFORMATION, ADVICE AND GUIDANCE

St Gabriel's prepares students for future success in education, employment and training by using the Gatsby Benchmarks; a framework that defines the best careers provision in schools and colleges. There is extensive work done with local colleges, employers and organisations such at the Comino Foundation to give students experiences of Further Education and different job sectors. See our recent Year 10 trip to Multi-award winning McCann advertising, where they won their advertising campaign competition:

In addition to our Student Senior Leadership Team, students also have the opportunity to take on servant leadership through being elected as Form Representative and joining our Student Council resultantly. In Year 10, students may also serve through becoming Peer Mentors, who play an active role in the transition of our new Year 7 cohorts.

All Year 7 students experience learning of BSL with the opportunity to complete their Level 1 and progress to Level 2 in Year 8 should they wish to.



THE QUALITY OF EDUCATION

We are particularly proud of the broad and rich curriculum our students benefit from at St Gabriel's. We have an excellent range of subjects and courses available to study, all of which have been carefully sequenced and rigorously planned to ensure our curriculum is **ambitious**, **aspirational** and **accessible**.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

We take great pride in the appearance and conduct of our pupils both whilst in school and whilst representing our school in the local area. Upholding our school's strong reputation by ensuring we are all dressed smartly and appropriately is of great importance to all stakeholders, and serves to prepare young people for future education and employment.

School uniform is to be worn by all pupils, and serves to support our mission statement – 'We are an inclusive Catholic family' – by reflecting the equality of opportunity afforded to every young person within our school community.

We are grateful to our supportive families for ensuring their children have the correct items in accordance with this policy, all of which can be purchased from our listed suppliers. Suppliers often provide discounts on school uniform in the summer term of each academic year (June - July). We have noted where items are also available from other high street retailers.

Students' uniform is checked by Form Teachers each morning, with positive 'Mission Points' awarded to those dressed in accordance with our expectations. Negative points are issued to students not adhering to the uniform policy, and staff have the right to confiscate prohibited items if appropriate. In very rare cases where students repeatedly contravene our uniform standards, Form Teachers will contact parents/ carers to discuss what support is required.

SANCTIONS

Sanctions are only issued if a student chooses not to meet our expectations. If this happens, your teacher will inform you of the sanction and the reason why it has been given. Remember to **FOCUS** in every lesson: Face the speaker, Offer answers, Check your posture, Undivided attention, Silence.

LEVEL	Sanction issued because a student has:
S1 Warning	 Chew gum and/or eat during lessons. Disrupt learning. Be impolite/rude towards other students or staff. Not fully complete classwork. Not fully complete homework. Can be viewed by staff, students and their parents/carers through Arbor
S2 Action	 Not adhere to the uniform policy. Not adhere to the mobile phone/devices policy. Not arrive with the correct equipment. Be up to 5 minutes late (without a note). Continue disrupting learning (S1 previously given) Use derogatory language. Not help when asked to do so by staff. Complete classwork to a poor standard. Complete homework to a poor standard. Form teachers are notified, parents/carers receive a message and staff issue an action to support students in correcting their conduct.
Social time detention	 Be defiant. Be up to 10 minutes late (without a note). Continue disrupting learning (S2 previously given) Use malicious language. Show a lack of respect for property or premises. Refuse to attempt classwork. Not submit any attempted homework. Form teachers, Heads of Department and Heads of Year are notified. Parents/carers receive a message. A 10-minute break or lunchtime detention is issued.
S4 Removal /After school detention	Continue disrupting learning (S3 already given). Form teachers, Heads of Department, Heads of Year and Deputy Headteachers are notified. Parents/carers receive a message. Students are removed and accompanied to where they will be supervised for the remainder of the lesson. A 30-minute after school detention with SLT is issued for the same day.
RED CARD Serious Incident	 Commit a serious incident of a potentially dangerous or illegal nature. Truant (i.e. being more than 10 minutes late or walking out of a lesson). Form teachers, Heads of Year, Deputy Headteachers and the Headteacher are notified. Parents/carers are contacted. Following investigation, the student maybe: Internally excluded; Suspended; Moved to another school; Permanently excluded.



ADMISSIONS POLICY

St Gabriel's RC High School is a Roman Catholic academy within the St Teresa of Calcutta Roman Catholic Academy Trust. The Academy Trust is the admissions authority, and the Local Governing Board is responsible for taking decisions on applications for admissions. For the school year commencing September 2024, the Trust has set its planned admissions number at 210 students.

Children with an Education Health and Care Plan, that name the school, will be given a place following consultation.

Admission to the school will be made by the Local Governing Board in accordance with the stated parental preferences it receives and subject to the following set of criteria which will be used to form a priority order if there are more applications for admission than the school has places available.

A	 Roman Catholic children who are in public care (IAPLAC) and previously looked after children and those children adopted from state care outside of England. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after but ceased to be so because they were adopted [1] (or became subject to a residence order [2] or special guardianship order).
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- Roman Catholic children living in a contributory parish and who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme.
- Roman Catholic children attending an Associated Roman Catholic primary school and who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme who have a brother or sister at the school at the time of transfer.
- Other Roman Catholic children attending an Associated Roman Catholic primary school and who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme.
 - Other Roman Catholic children who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme and have a brother or sister at the school at the time of transfer.
- Other Roman Catholic children in Maintained Roman Catholic primary schools and who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme.
- Roman Catholic children in other Maintained primary schools and who have completed the Diocesan Sacramental programme.
 - Other children in public care (IAPLAC) and previously looked after children and those children adopted from state care outside of England. Previously looked after children are children who were looked after, but ceased to be so because they were adopted [1] (or became subject to a residence order [2] or special guardianship order).
 - Other children.

The Trust recognises that the first responsibility of the school is to serve the Roman Catholic community for which it has been established. This is focused on designated parish communities and the Roman Catholic primary schools that are partners in providing for those communities. In establishing their oversubscription criteria, the Governors have also taken full account of the Code of Practice produced by the Department for Education and the emphasis placed on supporting children in public care.

A Supplementary Information Form should be completed in support of your application to St Gabriel's RC High School together with the following evidence:

- A copy of your child's Baptism Certificate
- Evidence of completion of the Diocesan Sacramental Programme
- Proof of address within a designated parish boundary in the form of a Council Tax bill (for pupils living within a contributory parish only).

BIOMETRIC CASHLESS CATERING SYSTEM

From September 2013, new measures in the Protection of Freedoms Act 2012 mean that any school that uses biometric recognition systems, such as finger identification, will need to obtain written consent from a parent/carer before they take and process their child's biometric data.

As St Gabriel's uses this system for pupils' lunches, the following information explains how the Biometric System works.

Bio – what?

Biometrics authentication is the automatic recognition of a living being using suitable body characteristics. By measuring an individual's physical features in an authentication inquiry and comparing this data with stored biometric reference data, the identity of a specific user is determined. There are many different biometric features that can be used for authentication purposes these include finger image, signature, iris, retina, DNA or any other unique characteristic. Once a characteristic has been chosen the next stage in the Biometric process is authentication. A biometric feature is saved on to a database. Once the data has been stored, a new scanning of the biometric feature is taken. If the comparison is positive, access to the appropriate application is granted.

A history of biometrics

Once the domain of the local constabulary, biometric technology is now being used at many locations around the country. Banks, supermarkets and now even schools and colleges are adopting this increasingly popular technology. Biometrics are not new, its roots have been traced back to ancient Egyptian times. The use of finger images as a security device started with Chinese officials using them to seal documents in the second century BC. Over the last few years the technology has begun to find favour commercially.

Whilst the use of biometrics has been steadily growing over the last ten years, the past couple of years have seen an explosion in development, interest and vendor involvement.

Biometrics and Security

Students, parents and staff can rest assured that the fingerprint images cannot be used by any other source for identification purposes. The system uses an image of the finger to create a mathematical algorithm and then discards the finger image; only the numbers remain and these cannot be reinterpreted back into a finger image.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Why do you need to take my child's finger image?

By taking an image of your child's finger we can turn this information into a digital signature.

Can finger images be used by any other agency?

No, the software we use turns your child's finger image into a mathematical algorithm. The image of the finger is then discarded. The information that is stored cannot be used to recreate an image of the child's finger.

How does it work?

When the child places his/her finger on the scanner, the software matches their finger image with the unique digital signature held in the database.
